# **Pastor's Note**

The 1776 version of <u>A New Dictionary of the Terms</u> <u>Ancient and Modern of the Canting Crew</u> included the Scottish proverb: It is ill making a silk purse of a sow's lug, or a touting [= tooting] horn of a tod's [= fox's] tail. Much of the Covid epidemic would fall under that category, but not all of it.

It taught us how quickly some folks can think on their feet. And it taught us that one of the most precious aspects of life is communication and relationships. And it taught us, at FCCF, that our church reach is much greater than the surrounds of Frankfort.

That happened when we went to live-streaming our worship services, and with so much coming at us at once, the thing that worked hung on for a long time, regardless of how good it was - or not. When the process of live-streaming began, it mainly fell between Facebook Live and YouTube. (Either one would have worked, but truthfully, YouTube seemed so much bigger and scarier!) But it wasn't as user friendly from the viewers side of things.

About a month or so ago, it became unfriendly from the technical side of things. For whatever reason, Facebook wasn't allowing us to do our thing. We still haven't figured out the reason, but it became a good motive for looking into YouTube as a host for our livestreamed events.

With great thanks to Leo Hughes, the switch happened almost overnight. There are still a few hiccups, but it seems far easier for people to watch a YouTube video than one on Facebook. Thus we have entered another realm of ministry to God's people.

How often to we shy away from things because they are new? Or "We've never done it that way before!" Or "We've always done it this way before!" (Those last two have been called the Seven Deadly Sins of the Church!) Change? Change? My grandmother gave the church that lightbulb!

I would never wish a plague on anyone, ever. But that most recent one has moved us as citizens of the earth, not always in ways we wished. Through it, and as always, God never leaves us, never forsakes us, and loves us more than we have words to describe. And that's downright astounding! I hope you have a great month of greening up! # **Missions Moment**

#### Water for Good + Lifewater International announce a merger effective January 1, 2024

Founded in 1977, Lifewater is a faith-based organization serving hard-toreach places in Ethiopia, Uganda, Tanzania, and Cambodia. Using the "Vision of a Healthy Village" approach, they focus on sustainable access to safe water, hygiene, and latrines. Their 149 employees are headquartered in Bentonville, Arkansas, and Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.

In 2004, Water for Good was founded by a missionary who saw the great need for clean water in the Central African Republic (CAR). The mission? Providing reliable water services in one of the poorest countries in the world. Water for Good is headquartered in Indianapolis, Ind., with 180 staff working remotely in the United States, Europe and the Central African Republic.

These two companies are excited to use their combined expertise to impact these countries with sustainable, safe water and improved sanitation and hygiene training. Their headquarters will be in Bentonville, Ark., and Addis Ababa. Ethiopia, with staff working remotely all over the globe. They will be using the name Water for Good, because Lifewater is often mistaken for LIFEWTR (bottled water) and Life Straws. When you do a Google search, LIFEWTR is often the first result. As an organization, Water for Good has stronger name recognition in the WASH (water, sanitation and hygiene) sector, including with foundations.

In 2023, 124 new water points were created, 3,628 hand pumps received maintenance and 5,167,900 jerry cans of water were collected from tapstands. rather than walking up to 30 miles for muddy stream water!

The tree stump on 5th Street has been removed and the Property Committee is researching how to refresh the area between the sidewalk and street.
